An Invitation to the Observance of a Holy Lent

ent begins soon. It starts with Ash Wednesday *(March 6th)* and lasts for the following six weeks. (Forty Days... not counting Sundays.) In the worship service for Ash Wednesday, as we begin our Lenten Journey, we are given the invitation "to the observance of a holy Lent..." (Prayer Book, page 265)

It is an invitation to turn more towards Jesus, and God's call to us to more deeply connected to His Love and Grace in our lives. But what makes for the observance of a holy Lent? How do we use the gift of these forty days?

You have no doubt heard about giving up something for Lent such as chocolate, desserts, meat, or anything that we tend to enjoy. Self denial is a symbolic way of heeding Jesus' call to *"take up our cross and follow."* (Mark 8:34, Matthew 16:24, Luke 9:23) Giving up something for Lent is a form of fasting. Which is a symbolic way of taking up our cross and denying ourselves. To deprive ourselves of some small pleasure or indulgence and offer that sacrifice up to God, can be a way of heightening our focus on God, and God's Presence in our lives. Or we might "give up" a bad habit such as smoking as a way of positively turning our life back toward what God wants for us. Another way of observing a holy Lent is to take on something, such as extra prayer time, the reading of scripture, visiting someone, attending worship services more regularly, or serving at a local ministry or mission. The intention of all of these is to turn our hearts more toward God, and to live more deeply in God's Presence. During Lent, we orient ourselves... our lives... our desires... our attention... toward God.

Lent takes the lead from Jesus and His forty days in the wilderness. In three of the Gospel accounts, Jesus is led into the wilderness by the Spirit in order to be tempted or tested by the devil. During those forty days Jesus fasts... eating very little. He is famished... It is when he is at his weakest that the temptations begin. All of the temptations are met with a firm and complete turn towards God and God's will for His life. The time in the wilderness served as a time of letting go, and trusting God. This is what makes for a holy Lent in our lives too.

To be clear, we are not Jesus! We will fail in our temptations. But the purpose of Lent is not to be perfect. The purpose of Lent is to help us become more able to let go of our control over our lives, and trust in God's Loving control over our lives. God loves you. Nothing will ever change that. Nothing we can do, or not do can make God love us less. So we already live in the reality of God's loving Presence now. Our call in life and faith, is to become more deeply connected into and aware of God's Loving Presence. Connectedness and awareness.

We live in a very busy era. There are distractions constantly pulling our attention away from the present moment. The observance of a holy Lent need not be a demand to do more. In fact, the observance of a holy Lent is an invitation to do less... to simplify. Just as the Spirit led/called Jesus into the wilderness to hear God's true call on His life; so the Spirit leads/calls us to a deeper listening to God's desire for our lives and our true self. During this Lent, we will have opportunity to go deeper in our relationship with God. To be embraced by the God of Love who loves us unconditionally. The Presence of God is always with us. God's Presence is healing, strengthening and refreshing. In the words of Thomas Keating, *"Everything in my life is transparent in this Presence. It knows everything about me- all my weaknesses, brokenness, sinfulness- and still loves me infinitely."* (Open Mind, Open Heart, by Father Thomas Keating)

Here are some practical ways:

1. Attend worship. Worshiping in community and receiving communion strengthens our faith and orients our life.

2. Find a few minutes each day (or "daily-ish") to sit in quiet stillness with God. It doesn't have to be long. Even a couple of minutes is good.

3. Practice being Grateful. Make a list each day of two or three things you are grateful for. It changes our outlook on life.

4. During Lent, turn off or silence the notifications on your phone. These things tend to only distract us from the present moment.

5. Fast from technology one day a week. Take a day, or even just a part of a day, each week to not check FaceBook or email... and focus more on the people right there around you.

6. Write notes to people. People love receiving cards or notes. This is a great way to connect.

7. Read a book on the topic of spiritual growth and faith.



The State of the Organ Address

If you were present on the third Sunday of Advent (December 16), you probably experienced a bit of shock as we started off into the final hymn of the 10 AM Sunday morning service. Snap... Crackle... Pop... Unfortunately, it wasn't the gentle sound of your breakfast cereal begging to be eaten.

Instead, it was the chaotic sounds of electrical interference that rendered the organ unusable. At first, when I was playing the hymn introduction, I thought it was feedback from the microphones in the church. I was frantically pushing stops off and changing settings (all while still playing...there's a reason that organists have to use all their limbs to play!) hoping that a reduced sound would stop what I thought was the microphone feedback. Oh, but was I wrong! The softer I got, the more noticeable the static became. It was then that I realized it was, as I'd feared, the organ breaking down. Fr. John leaned over to me and said, "I'm not sure it's getting any better, I think you'll have to go to the piano." As most of you will remember, I had to quickly scoot down the chancel and over to the piano to restart the hymn. While pianos are fantastically beautiful and versatile instruments, the piano in our nave has a less than desirable quality, and its muffled sound is no substitute for the magnificent sound of the King of Instruments. (Really, that's the organ's nickname!) I remember uncomfortably laughing after the service as Fr. John said to me, "I was expecting an explosion at any moment." I say uncomfortably because I knew he wasn't



making an exaggerated statement.

If you've been present at church much in the last few months, most likely, you've happened upon a Sunday where the organ was on the fritz. Most of those Sundays we were able to move along with minimal disruption... Those were the Sundays where we just had pipes but no digital aspects of the organ. Fortunately, we've only had the one major organ catastrophe on a Sunday morning. However, it has happened many times during the week when various organists have been practicing. The organ has now been serviced a number of times since November of 2018 and is still in need of major repair just to be functional.

For those who have no experience with the type of instrument we have, our organ is powered by a computer and, just like a regular computer, our organ has computer memory boards that control all of the electronic components of the instrument: powering on and off, controlling organ stops, volume, etc. Some of you may remember that back in November, there was another issue with the organ. One of these memory boards (there are four in our organ) had died leaving us with about one quarter of our organ stops dead. That was quickly fixed, but within minutes of the new board being installed, another one quit working. So, even with the new board in, we were still down one memory board. Astonishingly, before the second board could even arrive, the newly installed board was fried by electronic misfiring in the organ console. We'd now lost three memory boards in total. Our organ technician ordered a new board (luckily only charging labor costs for the replacement of the original fix) and came later to replace it. Most recently, a fourth memory board has died. This time, in addition to the death of the memory board, the entire digital components of the organ weren't functioning consistently. Sometimes the computer wouldn't even boot up rendering even the on/off switch useless. On those occasions, I've actually had to unplug the power supply for the organ to turn it off. It feels as if the slow, sometimes-dramatic, death of our organ has begun.

So, what's wrong with our instrument? Well, to be honest, I'm not entirely sure. There are a number of factors that could be causing the issues we were hearing. Firstly, there is likely an issue with wiring and electrical components that stems from high humidity in the church following Hurricane Florence. We had no climate control system in the church for approximately two months and during that time there were wild swings in humidity and temperature inside the building. There were many days where it would cool outside but the inside of the building kept the humidity bottled up. While beyond our control, it unfortunately wreaked havoc on the electronics of the organ. At this point, we still don't know the long-term damage to the instrument from the storm.

A second issue may be part or all of the culprit for our current dilemma... And it's also an issue that most people rarely want to address: The Age of the Instrument. Our organ is approximately 25–30 years old. I say approximately, because no one has been able to give me a firm figure on its age but I can make a well-informed guess based on circumstantial evidence. I do know the instrument had been in the church for several years before the splitting of the congregation in 2000 and I also know that a previous organist, Lawrence Stith, was said to have been very fond of playing the instrument, which he designed. For those who didn't know Lawrence, he last played here regularly in the 90s/early 2000s. Having grown up in this area, I also know that the organ was present in the church when I was a high school student in the late 90s. While 25–30 years old may not seem old for an organ, that is about 5 or so years beyond the average lifespan of a digital instrument like ours, 20–25 years. Considering that, we have been very fortunate not to have had major issues before this. Also consider that a wellmaintained mechanical organ that uses only pipes (no digital components) can last for centuries. This knowledge helps us to have a well-rounded perspective on the state and longevity of our instrument.

Looking forward, I worry that these issues, whether they be hurricane related, age related, both, or more, are the beginning of a series of problems with our organ. As the parish is intently focusing on long-range planning, it is a time to consider what is the next step for music in our parish. Repairing our current instrument, may not cost as much up front, but it also doesn't fix the issue of a digital organ that is in the final stages of its life. With repairs, we may be able to limp along for a few more years but must be prepared for unexpected interruptions due to other breakdowns. Does it feel overwhelming to think about this? Yes. Is it necessary to think about it? Absolutely.

Fortunately for us, we have several options available to us:

- Repair the existing instrument with the knowledge that it is only a temporary fix;
- Replace the existing instrument with a new digital instrument giving us a lifespan of 20–25 years;
- Replace the existing instrument with a refurbished pipe organ giving us a long-term solution; or
- Replace the existing instrument with a new pipe organ which is custom-built for us providing centuries of use.

At this point, we have options and nothing is set in stone. However, we need to begin a discussion on what path we should take. At the February Vestry meeting, Fr. John, on my behalf, presented a formal organ report and the Vestry has given its permission for Fr. John and I to form an exploratory committee and learn about the options available to us. So, what can the ancient practices of Christian contemplative faith have to do with today's world? The answer is... A Lot!

During this Lent, we will have opportunity to go deeper in our relationship with God. To be embraced by the God of Love who loves us unconditionally. The Presence of God is always with us. God's Presence is healing, strengthening and refreshing. In the words of the late Thomas Keating, a leader in the modern practices of Christian contemplative faith, "Everything in my life is transparent in this Presence (of God). God knows everything about me- all my weaknesses, brokenness, sinfulness- and still loves me infinitely."

During Lent, you are invited to explore ways to deepen your faith through contemplative practices of faith. The book Mindful Silence: The Heart of Christian Contemplation by Phileena Heuertz, is a very accessible, well-written book on applying ancient Christian practices into today's busy life. Phileena brings a fresh, Generation X perspective to spirituality and life. She is co-founder of The Gravity Center for Contemplative Activism, and on the board of Richard Rohr's Center for Contemplation and Action.

Walk the "Way of the Cross"
